The committee set up to save the hall has raised about \$13,000 so far, members said. Also,

More fundraising efforts are being arranged for 2012.

the town has agreed to provide about \$18,000 earmarked for demolition to help with the move.

The move itself will cost \$18,800, while \$8,500 will be needed to remove and replace the roof

so that Little Hall can fit under utility lines.

The price tag for restoration isn't yet known. Kucera said that some estimates come in at about \$25,000, but much depends on a structural examination after the move.

Little Hall was built in 1920 as a school for the children of Czech families in the area, according to local histories. The road to the original site is still known as Bohemian Hall Road.

In 1978, it was moved to the campus of Silverhill School, where it served as a band room and

assembly hall. When the school needed land for a new gymnasium, the hall was sold to the town for \$1 and moved to its location near the water tower in the 1980s.

Jennifer Fidler grew up near the hall, and it holds a warm place in her memories.

Fidler, now Fairhope public works director, said that the hall sat next to land owned by her family. She recalled a cousin's wedding being held there in the 1970s, after a rainstorm halted plans for an outdoor event.

"Some of the wood for this came from my grandfather's property," she said. "It's part of our
